Since our last newsletter we have put together our plan to reduce our carbon emissions in line with our declaration of a climate emergency last June.

Just before Christmas we published our action plan which concentrates on three key themes – transport, energy and housing. We have already started on our tree planting programme and are taking steps to ensure that the energy used in our council buildings comes from a renewable source. We have also adopted a new Council Plan setting out our priorities for the next five years. Action on the environment will be at the forefront of everything we do, but improving the services that we offer to residents is high on our agenda too. We want to make a real difference to the quality of the lives of all our residents and this is a blueprint that gives us the ability to do just that.

Over the last six months we have been changing the way we engage with you and making our meetings more accessible. We have introduced public questions at meetings of Full Council and are now audio live streaming our major meetings which are also available on our website. We have been very encouraged by the attendance of

individuals and local groups at our meetings which shows that there is a willingness to talk to us and we are certainly willing to listen.

We still face many challenges and by the time you read this we will have set the budget for the next financial year. But we know where we want to improve and, with your help, we will work together to move forward in the spirit of collaboration and partnership.

Over the coming months you'll see more and more from your council to promote action on climate change - we're focussing on reducing our carbon emissions and encouraging others to reduce theirs, and are taking action to promote climate resilience.

In March, we are bringing together children from schools across our district for the first ever Climate Emergency Parliament, providing a platform for the voices of young people to be heard. In June we will hold a conference to set out how we can work together across the district to deliver this vital agenda.


We will measure and report all we do so you can hold us to account for our promises.

Here's what we've been working on in the last six months:

 In December 2019, we installed 22 solar panels on the council's depot in Winnall, which will generate up to 7,000 kilowatt of eco-friendly energy each year – that's the equivalent of charging 630,000 mobile phones!

- Ecologically considerate naturalised planting – tree planting across the district, and we have plans to both safeguard the Garrison Ground as playing fields and create wildlife habitats too.
- Increased recycling we've introduced glass recycling collections to 50,000 households across the district and are looking at improving garden waste collections too.
- Changes to the way our developments are shaped – turn to page 7 to find out what measures have been taken to lessen the environmental impact of Winchester Sport and Leisure Park.
- Steps to see the council change its contracting policies so low carbon is at the heart of all services, whether we carry them out or they are delivered by

- someone else on our behalf a good example is the improved Biffa bin lorries.
- Changes to how we manage parking will see further improvements to air quality.
- Plans to increase the number of electric vehicle charging points across the district to fuel the (commendable!) growing appetite for low carbon vehicles.

HOLDING BACK THE ELEMENTS

Remember the floods of 2013/14? So do we...

Efforts to stop the city flooding continue with clearance work to enable construction of the final section of a major scheme at Durngate. From Easter we'll be installing three new sluice gates on the River Itchen, completing our network of defences across the north of the city to help to control flooding, especially by City Mill and The Broadway.

Work will take about six months and is being done in partnership with Hampshire County Council and the Environment Agency.

In the meantime, across Winchester district we continue to pay particular attention to July 15 – when folklore says our local Bishop, St Swithun may react to a downpour with a further 40 days of rain!



32 NEW ELECTRIC CAR

CHARGE POINTS FOR THE DISTRICT

We're looking to make life easier for the increased number of electric vehicle owners, by installing 32 new charge points in car parks across our district.

Most of the points are 'fast' 22kWh chargers which means they take between three to six hours to fully charge an electric car, depending on the vehicle's battery size and charge state. There will be two rapid 50kWh chargers in the city to enable a move to electric taxis.

CLEANER AIR IN WINCHESTER

Part of our commitment to local people is that we will measure and report on performance when we've set out to do something. You may be aware that we're determined to deliver air quality improvements – with some hotspots across the city's Air Quality Management Area being targets for change.

Our measuring kits include some 37 air sampling devices - known as 'NO* tubes' which measure levels of nitrogen dioxide. And the results are encouraging - more areas of central Winchester are now meeting national standards

for nitrogen dioxide (NO²), an environmental pollutant. Some locations in our 'Air Quality Management Area' - Andover Road, Chesil Street, St Cross Road and Alresford Road, are now within legal limits for NO².

And our squad of NO* tubes will shortly be joined by a new recruit on St George's Street. From the spring a clever new monitoring device will be measuring levels of PM10 and PM2.5 – fine particulate matter that can be present in the atmosphere, supporting our work to further clean up the city's air.

RINGING IN THE CHANGES

A new strategy for parking, designed to cut congestion and pollution, and to encourage low carbon ways to access our town centres, has been developed following consultation with local people.

In Winchester, the strategy adopts a 'three-ring' approach that is intended to encourage people to park outside our central Air Quality Management Area. The central, inner, and outer rings will be subject to different levels of parking charges – with the outer rings, including Park & Ride, being the cheapest. Income from parking charges will be reinvested into improved parking and public transport options.

Special plans are being developed tailored to the needs of Wickham, Denmead, Alresford, Whiteley and Bishop's Waltham.



Down at Bar End, Winchester's new state-of-the-art sport and leisure facility is really starting to take shape. The leisure centre, set to open in early 2021, now has floors and a complete steel frame.

We have an ambitious target to build 1,000 new council homes by 2030. We'll ensure we build a range of size of house and provide different ways for you to rent it from us so everyone has a home to live in, and that it is done in a way that fits in making the district greener.

Recently 13 homes were built in Knowle including Knowle Halt Lodge. This is a block of six one-bedroom flats all of which benefit from various sustainable features.

Project Manager in the New Homes Delivery team, Deborah Sunley said,

"One of the best features of Knowle Halt Lodge is that it uses air source heat pumps instead of gas boilers and it also benefits from higher levels of insulation and high performance glazing. All of this combined helps to reduce emissions and energy use and means tenants will have cheaper energy bills."

SUPPORT WHERE IT COUNTS 🐇

Many things can lead to homelessness. And once someone has become homeless, it's often really hard for people to re-establish themselves in our community.

To help give support where it counts, 12 self-contained flats in Sussex Street have been renovated and specialised support service Two Saints is helping make sure the residents get the help they need to start living independently. This is part of a 'Housing First' approach which sees people offered accommodation as a first

step to overcoming the issues they are facing.

Regional director of Two Saints, James McDermott said,



"This new accommodation will make a real difference and provide the right support to people experiencing homelessness and it's the first step on their journey to finding more permanent accommodation."

Supported by both Winchester City Council and Hampshire County Council, the new centre marks the city council's commitment to end rough sleeping by 2023.

A DAY IN THE LIFE OF...

OUR HOUSING INCOME TEAM LEADER



Zadia Green works in the Housing department at Winchester City Council as a team leader for our Income Team - we asked her to tell us about her work...

Tell us about your job

Our team is responsible for collecting the rent from Winchester City Council tenants and issuing helpful reminders so they remember to pay their rent on time. Most of our tenants need very little prompting but if they experience financial difficulties we step forward to offer help and support. It's about avoiding having to go down a legal route – at worst this can lead to taking possession of someone's

home, and no one wants that to happen.

How did you become a housing officer?

I went to Cardiff University to do an MA in Archaeology as a mature student. I was really keen to return into employment after being a student and so started temping in the housing department in 2001; it was such a change - from studying ancient Greek houses to modern social housing!

I found the work so interesting and loved the team. I went on to become a Tenant Participation Officer, working on tenant newsletters and supporting tenant groups. Then my next job at the council was as a Housing Officer where I eventually honed in on specialising in rent arrears cases.

What may surprise people?

It's the fact that you do not just wear one hat. When people hear about what our team does, they often think we just chase debt like credit card companies - but we do so much more. It's all about listening and giving support. And it's not all about money either

TURN UP THE HEAT WITH LEAP!

Could you be eligible for a heating upgrade in your home? A new scheme called LEAP provides free energy surveys to people on a low income or those suffering from fuel poverty. We're working with Agility Eco to provide funding for heating upgrades to eligible homes; making buildings warmer, cheaper to heat and reducing their carbon footprint.

So if you are struggling to afford to heat your home, are receiving Tax Credits, Housing Benefit, or have a long term illness or disability give LEAP a call to see if they can help.

– what lies behind someone not paying their rent is often a combination of factors. People can be struggling with their mental health, fighting personal battles to change their lifestyle and dealing with difficult family circumstances. We always treat people as individuals and try to direct them to the right support to help resolve their problems.

Most rewarding part of the job?

Easy - the most rewarding part is making a difference to someone's life. When you have worked hard with a tenant who has been struggling and they make the final payment clearing their rent arrears. This marks a real milestone from being in debt to being in financial control. Our customers are the reason we are here and it's really rewarding when at the end of the process they are in a better position. They often call to thank us for all our help which really lifts your day!

REVITALISING THE HEART OF THE CITY

An open forum in September brought people up to date on plans to transform the area around the bus station. Main "must have" themes were discussed, echoing the vision set out in the central Winchester regeneration Strategic Planning Document (SPD). Local people let us know that they wanted the area to have:

- a mix of uses with links to creative industries;
- high quality public realm;
- trees;
- places to sit and green spaces;
- pedestrian and cycle friendly routes and to be car free

There were also lively discussions around parking, independent retail and plans to build social networks.



The feedback is already shaping the development of options for the site within the framework of the supplementary planning document. More public engagement is already taking place and detailed options will be published later this year.

WINCHESTER'S FIRST DESIGN FESTIVAL SET TO SHOWCASE THE CITY'S CREATIVITY

The city's first ever design festival will showcase the area's thriving creative industries in the Autumn half term. This new event in the city's calendar aims to attract talent and investment into the region, and inspire young people to pursue a career in the sector.

HISTORIC SPACE GETS TLC

Cutting through from the High Street to Market Lane you will start to see change as the first phase of work to improve St Maurice's Covert takes place.

New paving, benches and street furniture are going in now. New lighting, redecoration and a display of the removed gravestones will be coming next. Undercover cycle stands will remain while those in the open are being re-provided elsewhere.

We listened to what local businesses and residents said the space needed and architects Scott Whitby Studio drew up the ideas in response.



BISHOP'S WALTHAM IN BUSINESS

Encouraging a wide range of employment opportunities across the district is a key priority and we're providing three new units in Bishop's Waltham for 'light industrial use'. The work at Bishop's Waltham depot fits in with our plans to develop workspaces in areas with sustainable transport links. Renewable heat technologies and rainwater collection at the depot will be installed to reduce the carbon. Construction is expected to be completed in late 2021.

BUSINESS FRIENDLY

Your council's innovative work to grow the economy across the district has been recognised by the Federation of Small Business.



We took home a business friendly award for two events where local businesses set the agenda to identify practical ways to improve the city's profile.

Two ideas from these events are already having an impact:

- From March, free public wi-fi will be available in Winchester city centre providing residents and visitors with fast, efficient internet connectivity.

YOUR **BIN COLLECTION**JUST GOT **Greener!**

You'll soon be seeing greener bin lorries and a new household service to collect small electrical equipment for recycling in the district thanks to our waste contractor Biffa.

A new vehicle fleet will replace older lorries with Euro6 compliant vehicles which emit lower levels of harmful exhaust pollutants.

Biffa has already stepped up the use of narrower vehicles to improve access to places that are hard to reach in the bigger lorries.

The adoption of new technology on board the lorries is also planned to provide real-time information about how collections are going. If there is an issue, the software alerts the team at the depot HQ to issues and they can quickly respond. This will help the council's Customer Service team communicate any issues to residents who are contacting us with a query.





DID YOU KNOW?

Performance of the current service is improving month-onmonth. The latest figures showed the number of missed bins reported was fewer than 0.1% of collections – half of what it was a year ago.

Since the **new glass collection** service was
launched we've **collected 756 tonnes of glass** (to
December 2019) across
the district!

DOG BREEDERS BANNED

On 31 January this year two unlicensed dog breeders left Southampton Crown Court having been disqualified from breeding puppies for six years and fined over £615k under the Proceeds of Crime Act 2002. Dave Griffiths, Winchester City Council's Senior Animal Welfare Officer spoke about the case,

"This is a high profile win in terms of making sure premises in the Winchester district are licensed, but our day-to-day job can be one of the most rewarding you can imagine. Returning stray dogs to their owners and inspecting licensed premises has a hugely positive impact on the quality of life for animals.

"Ours is a rewarding field to operate in, we see selfless dedication of the teams working in animal welfare charities, dog rescue societies, vets, kennels and of course the big hearted owners who are prepared to give a rescue dog that life transforming second chance."

Dave's team have recently been awarded two Gold RSPCA Awards: for both animal licensing and their work with stray dogs.

And it's that licensing work that's hit the headlines following a tip off to the council from someone who saw suspicious looking activity around puppy sales. Dave explains, "When we monitored social media posts selling litters of puppies it became clear that the people posting were breeders. We contacted them directly to warn them of the need for a licence but they continued to operate without one so we continued gathering evidence. Although posts appeared to be from different people, the contact details kept pointing to the same individuals. In all, we discovered 193 litters were advertised for sale over a five year period – so the operation was on a serious scale."

Summing up at Southampton Crown Court on 31 January, Judge Henry addressed the court, "The illegal operation had been carried out for some time. The defendants had been warned of the need for a licence and said they were giving up breeding but kept going for a number of years. They kept no records of the lucrative business, and they used other people's names without permission to sell the puppies."

Dave reflects on the case, "These cases take a huge amount of time and resources and when you do get a result like

this it makes it worthwhile. We hope this will send a message to others that we will not accept illegal dog breeding in the district."





COUNCIL BUDGET 2020/21

We have been doing things a bit differently lately. This year for the first time, we asked you to try to balance our budget. About 100 of you tried our budget simulator.

We then took the 100 responses you gave us and asked you some specific questions about the difficult choices we have to make given the backdrop of cuts in central governments grants to all local authorities. Our online consultation saw double the number of responses compared to previous years. We received over 3,000 comments.

Cllr Neil Cutler explains,

"Our Council Plan gave a clear commitment to improve service quality whilst balancing the budget and addressing the Climate Emergency. I'm really pleased to be bringing forward proposals that support all of these aims, for example £750,000 for climate change and a further £247,000 to survey our 30,000 trees in the district. Trees are a vital part of our ecosystem, but need systematic care and maintenance."

Our proposal to introduce charges on a Sunday in the most central car parks was supported during the consultation so we will introduce this in

the city's Air Quality Management Area whilst maintaining free provision in all other car parks and introducing Sunday Park & Ride services.

We will improve the garden waste collection service introducing wheeled bins with more garden waste taken at each collection. Only people that use this service will pay for it, as we'll introduce an annual charge like many other councils.

Despite our best efforts, due to the continuing reduction in government grant, we propose a Council Tax increase of 3% but this budget demonstrates our clear commitment to managing the council on a sound financial basis."



COMMUNITY ACTION? GRANTED!

CROWDFUND WINCHESTER

We are working with online platform Crowdfunded to help local people and organisations raise investment for great ideas. Using an innovative match-funding approach, projects must pitch online to attract extra funding of up to £2,000. Bidders must be able to secure backing for 25 per cent of the required target. The council has a £120,000 fund to support this exciting new initiative.

Who can apply?

Social enterprises, local businesses or not-for-profit organisations are amongst the groups that can apply. Projects need to support the council's priority areas. COMMUNITY INFRASTRUCTURE FUND - BIDS WELCOME

Organisations from across the Winchester district are seeing real benefits from £600k that's been allocated for good causes from our Community Infrastructure Levy fund. Projects receiving a boost include: Abbotts Barton and Hyde Scout Group for a new Scout & Community Hall and Littleton & Harestock Parish Council to help fund a local Parkour sports facility.

Can my organisation apply?

Bids can now be made for between £10,000 and £200,000 to support physical improvements to local areas such as playgrounds, green spaces, and sports facilities. Organisations such as parish councils and community groups can apply for the entire cost of a scheme, or for partfunding. The deadline for applications is 31 March 2020. 

With its pastel painted Georgian houses, independent shops, and a variety of pubs and awardwinning tea rooms, it's little wonder that Alresford is one of the top destinations in the Winchester district.

History

Henri de Blois, brother of King Stephen and Bishop of Winchester, is credited with the idea of building the Great Weir or dam and designed the T-shaped town that would soon become New Alresford in the 12th/13th century. By the 14th century it had developed into a prosperous market town but much of the medieval town was destroyed in a fire in 1689-90. The town was mostly rebuilt in the 18th century with many of the Georgian buildings remaining today.

Eating out

Alresford boasts a range of eateries to tempt any palate. If cosy country pubs are what you're after then look no further than the four character-filled establishments that grace the centre.

Shopping

From children's toys to a treasure trove of collector's items, exploring Alresford's independent shops is a unique experience.

Entertainment and events

Alresford is famous for the Mid Hants Railway more commonly known as the Watercress Line that operates between the town and Alton. The railway operates regular services with a variety of steam trains running on the line. Don't miss the annual Watercress Festival – this year's event takes place on 17 May.


