COUNCIL TAX: EASING ENERGY COSTS

If your property is in Council Tax band A to D you're in line to receive £150 this April thanks to the Government's Council Tax Energy Rebate. The £150 cash payment will be made directly into your bank account to help ease rising energy costs which are impacting on many household budgets.

The Government has also provided further support for people who may not otherwise be eligible – for example if you're on a low income and your home is valued in bands E to H. We are awaiting more guidance and further details from the Government about how the rebate will be administered so please keep an eye on our website for information as it becomes available.

Transforming an important part of our historic city to see us into the future while respecting our heritage is a major undertaking.

Thousands of local people and businesses have been involved in detailed public consultation over several years, and the Central Winchester Regeneration Supplementary Planning Document captures that shared vision.

We're delighted to be working on appointing a development partner to drive forward our shared ambition and make this exciting dream a reality. Meanwhile, as promised, work has already started to make some important changes to the area...

LUNCH WITH THE LADYBIRDS IN OUR CITY CENTRE

We're working on creating a brand new open space on the site of the Friarsgate Medical Centre site to create brand-new public outdoor space whilst plans for the longer-term regeneration of the site are progressed.

The new park will be fully accessible to all, opening up the area to create a route between Friarsgate and The Broadway. Open areas with seating and lighting will allow small events to be held in collaboration with local cultural and arts organisations, and the green space will enhance biodiversity, creating a new habitat for pollinators and encouraging wildlife into the city centre.



Another key part of our shared vision for the future of the city centre is to reduce traffic, making the area more pedestrian friendly and cutting carbon emissions as part of our climate action commitment. As well as completing a new Park & Ride facility at Bar End (see page 10 for details) we're also working to relocate Winchester Bus Station and redirect traffic away from the centre.

NEW CREATIVE QUARTER

We've also been working on creating a cultural quarter in Kings Walk that will breathe new life into this underused part of our city. Eventually the buildings in Kings Walk will be demolished to make way for a pedestrian-friendly cultural area. Until these plans are finalised, the buildings will be transformed into flexible workspaces so independent creative enterprises and start-ups can join us in the city centre.

WORLD CLASS CAMPUS: FOR CREATIVE LEARNING IN WINCHESTER

The council is in discussions with Winchester School of Art (part of The University of Southampton) about their ambitions for a potential campus expansion to create a national seat of learning on the site of the old leisure centre.

This proposal would cement Winchester's existing reputation as a strong educational hub with its considerable 'knowledge based' economy and vibrant creative centre.

We're currently considering comments made in response to an advert placed relating to the disposal of the open space on the site and a further report will be brought to Cabinet later this month.

BAR END DEVELOPMENT FRAMEWORK

During the construction of Winchester Sport and Leisure Park, the council met regularly with the Bar End Forum – a group of local residents and ward councillors – to guide the way forward.

We developed a Design Framework setting out aspirations for the local area which included residents' calls for a local convenience store, a mixed use scheme, green space and access improvements.

Following a petition that was handed to Council at the start of the year from the local community, we have committed to further community engagement about the future of the Bar End depot site. A drop-in event will be held on 8 March between 3-7.30pm at the Winchester Sport and Leisure Park for local people to put forward their views, and we'll also offer an online link to make sure everyone can share their aspirations before we dispose of the site.

FULL STEAM AHEAD FOR ST CLEMENTS SURGERY

The NHS has given the go ahead for plans to build a new medical centre for Winchester's St Clements Surgery. Planning permission has already been granted, and work will start later this year on the site of the nearby Upper Brook Street car park.



We're looking forward to enhancing city life in Winchester on several fronts. The Central Winchester Regeneration opportunity will see an improved public realm and tempting retail offer, deliver environmentally friendly options which actively reduce our carbon footprint, and retain young people in Winchester though innovative employment options.

But we're working across the whole setting – speaking to residents about the future of Bar End, giving the University of Southampton an opportunity to explore the potential of a new campus on the River Park site, and looking forward to work starting on St Clements Surgery this year.

Winchester must change to thrive and we're investing in our wonderful heritage city to make sure we're economically and sustainably fit for the future.

HELPING LOCAL BUSINESS WEATHER THE STORM

COVID-19 restrictions hit many local businesses really hard so our teams have been busy sharing information about latest support grants – and making sure they reach our district's businesses.

Since April 2020 over

£51.4 million

has been given out, including funding to support businesses that had to adapt or diversify in order to survive. This is in addition to the

£41 million

of Business Rates relief that the council has applied to businesses across the district.



STYLISH SUPPORT

Savvy city centre boutique Sass and Edge used a grant to stay afloat and move the business forward explains Business partner Rachel Hunt:

"The grant gave us security as we had just taken delivery of our Spring/Summer stock and our first priority was to pay our suppliers. Having the business interruption loan gave us the space we needed to develop ideas and focus on social media as a way of keeping in contact with our customer base during the lockdowns. The success of this enabled us to move into larger premises on Market Street and take on more staff."



A TASTY TURNOVER IN MEON VALLEY

Ben Sawyers from Meon Valley Butchers used a grant of £10,000 to convert the traditional family-run shop into an e-commerce success story. By offering locally sourced products coupled with first-class customer service, his business is booming:

"During the COVID-19 restrictions we launched a new website with online shop to increase our customer base. Turnover doubled and we had to take on extra staff to meet demand! Even though our doors have remained open, online ordering is extremely popular and 2021 was our most successful Christmas to date. We've since opened a bakery in store and increased the range of high quality products you can't find in supermarkets."

ST MAURICE'S MURAL

St Maurice's Covert, located in the heart of the city centre, is set to receive a colourful makeover. Artists have been invited to submit designs for a new and inspiring mural to transform the covered space, creating a visual gateway to the Cathedral from the High Street.



We're working hard on two fronts at the moment – supporting business recovery here and now, and also laying down the foundations for a long term sustainable economy.

Considering the devastating impact of COVID-19 on the national economy, we're pleased to see so many of our businesses getting back on their feet. We're well known locally for our innovation and creativity, and we've certainly seen this play to our advantage – whether its businesses reinventing themselves with online offshoots and home deliveries, or our own ShopAppy virtual high street that's offering them a platform to sell from.

Over £50 million in grants and £41 million in Business Rates relief have played their part, and local people have rallied around district businesses – particularly the independents that we're so proud of. We've seen footfall recover quickly, and with so much to see and do in our centres, we encouraging day-trippers – this makes all the difference to our much loved shops, eateries, bars and attractions.

As well as providing advice and financial support, we've also been busy helping local businesses navigate the complexities of new legislation and COVID-19 restrictions to keep their employees and the public safe. Over the past 18 months we have:

BARFIELDS 2: OUR NEWEST PARK & RIDE



Changing the way we move about our district is fundamental to tackling climate change, so we've created 287 new Park & Ride spaces in Bar End, to encourage people to park outside the city centre, and improve air quality.

The new car park provides 16 electric vehicle charging bays and more will be added as demand increases. These are powered by

photovoltaic panels, meaning the car park operation is carbon neutral. A screening green wall has been installed and when established will help improve the air quality of the area.

Handy for the new sport & leisure centre and the attractions of Winchester, Barfields 2 offers a pleasant 15 minute walk into town along a riverside route, or a short hop on one of the regular Park & Ride buses... give it a go next time you make a day trip to Winchester!



WHEN A NEIGHBOURHOOD TAKES ACTION...

Winchester Action on Climate Change (WinACC) and the Centre for Sustainable Energy (CSE) are supporting us to establish 'climate action hubs' across the Winchester district. Local communities and Parish Councils can get free advice on the best way to tackle climate change in their neighbourhoods, and, with more and more communities taking step towards carbon neutrality the goal for our district becomes more achievable.

Here's what happened when one Parish Council reviewed their report...



"When we received a copy of CSE's report on our very own parish carbon footprint we were amazed to see such a detailed analysis and immediately saw the potential benefits it had to offer, such as raising awareness locally and focusing on what residents can do to change behaviours."

OUR GREEN CREDENTIALS

When it comes to the climate action, your council pledged to 'go first'.

Our deadline to become net zero is 2024 and over 100 staff have received Carbon Literacy Training making us one of the first BRONZE Carbon Literate Organisations in the UK. This earned us a seat on the Carbon Literacy Project event during COP 26 to share how we did it – we've now got our sights set on SILVER. In the last two years we have:



cut 468 tonnes from our carbon footprint 2019/2020



reduced our co² emissions by 19% by switching to green electricity



invested £15m to cut co² in council housing



installed 849m² of solar planels at Winchester Sport & Leisure Park



received a BREEAM **excellent** rating at our new leisure centre



recycled 5,500 tonnes of garden waste



installed more than **40** new electric vehicle charging points in public car parks



planted 1,224









adopted a **Biodiversity** Action Plan



achieved 80% of all actions in Year 1



created 17 wildflower areas, each has introduced 25 native species



introduced kerbside glass, battery and small electrical items collections



increased glass collection by 100 tonnes each month across the district



Winchester City Council sat on COP26 panel to share how we trained 126 staff and received the **BRONZE Carbon** Literate Organisation award



Our district is leading the way when it comes to switching to sustainable power supply...

We've installed solar panels at Winchester Sport & Leisure Park which are expected to generate 156.3MWh of energy per year, equating to a reduction in emissions of 150 tonnes of CO₂e. And solar panels at Marwell Zoo and Biffa HQ generate an income for the council. A simple action that you can take to reduce your carbon footprint is to switch to a renewable energy supplier. DID YOU KNOW?

The recent assessment of all councils' climate action plans by Climate Emergency UK showed your council's plan to reach Net Zero is one we can be proud of. Our 'score' of 49% was above the average score for district councils of 43%, and the plan rated third of the eleven district councils in Hampshire and in the top third of all district councils in the UK (58th out of 181)!

HOW CAN YOU REDUCE YOUR CARBON FOOTPRINT?



Take some small steps and be part of a big difference:

- Buy local and seasonal with fabulous farm shops and one of the biggest Farmers' Markets in the UK we're spoilt for choice!
- Grow your own nothing beats the satisfaction of a window box crop, or sharing a particularly abundant harvest with friends, colleagues and neighbours.
- Re-use and repair before buying new repair shops are popping up across the UK. www.repaircafewin.com
- Try online buying and selling sites like Vinted, Depop and Ebay. Your clothes may suit someone else and you may want to update your own wardrobe with the proceeds.



Only buy what you need – bulk buy deals are tempting, but if the food ends up in a landfill, the planet loses out.

- Use public transport, walk or cycle for more journeys you'll get fit as well as benefit local air quality.
- Switch to a renewable energy supplier. www.bigcleanswitch.org
- Replace lights with the most efficient bulbs (e.g. LEDs).
- Look into getting your home properly insulated



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OUR SPENDING PRIORITIES FOR THE YEAR AHEAD

BALANCING THE BOOKS, INVESTING IN OUR DISTRICT AND ADDRESSING THE CLIMATE EMERGENCY...

The pandemic placed real pressure on your council's finances, but after a tough year we have proposed a positive budget which spends more on public services and keeps increases to council tax, council housing rent and other charges well below inflation. In the year ahead we will invest:



£100,000

to continue the Council Tax hardship grant scheme



£150,000

to launch food waste collections in 2023



£185,000

on cleaning our towns and tackling fly tipping



£450,000

on essential maintenance to historic monuments



£250,000

to introduce electric bin lorries and/or buses to the city



£40,000

to promote walking and cycling



£25,000 to support our commitment to the City of Sanctuary movement



We'll also be offering a **£10** discount on garden waste subscriptions for residents in receipt of benefits



LOCAL DEVELOPMENT HELPING OUR COMMUNITIES

In our district, 30 community projects have already been allocated from CIL funding, including new playground equipment and improvements to community centres, sports facilities and open spaces. Recent CIL funded projects include the installation of new playground equipment at Wickham and a parkour facility at Littleton Recreation ground.

Why are we telling you this?

Well, the current round of bidding is open until 31 March 2022, for grants of between £10,000 and £200,000!

A century after the first council houses were built in Stanmore, the popular neighbourhood has welcomed a new development of affordable homes.

Part funded by a £6 million grant from Homes England, the scheme was built by local company Drew Smith Ltd and all the new homes were designed to be as low carbon and energy efficient as possible in line with our commitment to becoming a carbon neutral council by 2024.

New residents Nathan and Lauren say the shared ownership scheme allowed them to leave rented accommodation and get onto the property ladder, something they previously thought impossible:



"We met while studying at Winchester and after several years of working and renting in the city we had given up hope of being able to afford to buy our own place here. Thanks to shared ownership our monthly payments are actually lower than we previously paid in rent! We are so happy in our new home. It's spacious, comfortable, modern and, best of all, it's ours."

With many young people struggling to afford to live in the communities where they grew up, the need for more affordable homes to rent and buy is just as crucial in rural as well as urban areas.

That's why a development of 35 new affordable, environmentally friendly homes in Kings Worthy was prioritised for people with a strong local connection to the area

Making the most of their rural location, the new homes stand adjacent to Top Field, a beautiful outdoor area managed by the council that features wildlife habitats, wooded areas, a wildflower meadow and footpaths.

We have exciting plans to develop more affordable and environmentally friendly homes across our district. In fact, by the end of 2023 the following schemes will be completed...

new homes in North Whiteley (work is underway on the delivery of 21 two-bedroom homes, 29 three-bedroom houses and four four-bedroom properties)

new flats and three new houses in Winnall, plus a transformation of the public space and the creation of a pocket park for the whole community to enjoy (pictured).



EXTRA CARE
ONE BIG
FAMILY

Helping people to live as independently as possible for as long as possible is at the heart of our three Extra Care Schemes in Winchester.

Chesil Lodge, Danemark Court and Matilda Place are retirement communities where residents from age 55 upwards enjoy the independence of their own apartment, company when they want it, and the reassurance of knowing care is on hand if or when it's needed.



These communities aren't care homes; residents live totally independently, making their own choices and managing their own lives. For those who need extra support, there is onsite care available 24/7, plus a dedicated member of staff to help with day-to-day issues such as maintenance and repairs, benefits and utilities.

Living in one of these three purposebuilt communities is a very sociable experience. There's always something 66

going on for those who want to take part. From a fun game of bingo in the communal lounge, a shared meal in the dining room, to soaking up the sunshine with friends and neighbours in the communal garden; there's no reason for anyone to ever feel alone.

SUPPORTING MORE PEOPLE IN PRIVATE RENTED ACCOMMODATION COVID-19 has been a tough time for people on low incomes, and we're keen to make sure we do all we can to make sure private rented tenants are protected from the risk of losing their home.

Our latest Open Spaces Assessment lists play areas, parks, recreation grounds, sports fields and green areas across the district, and outlines how we plan to ensure more are provided as the population increases and new homes are built.

Do be wary of bogus waste collection outfits – their actions can lead to trouble for the householder down the line if the evidence is traced back – just one more example of why this environmentally irresponsible behaviour is socially toxic too."

BREEDING BAN, FINES AND COMMUNITY SERVICE: PUPPY FARM SLAMMED



We have successfully prosecuted an unlicensed dog breeding business which sold at least 193 litters of 38 breeds over a five year period between 2013-2018. Two puppy farmers have been banned from breeding dogs for six years, must undertake 60 hours unpaid community work, and in total were fined over £292,000.

HOW ARE WE DOING?


In 2019 2,000 people across the district responded to our last survey, letting us know what mattered most to them.


