

Glass recycling was introduced in 2019 and we've seen 2400 tonnes collected so far this year





Our hard work to tackle climate change and reduce our carbon footprint was recognised in July when we received the Carbon Literacy Bronze award.

The Carbon Literacy Project encourages organisations and local authorities to better understand how we can change our working behaviour and all do our bit to help protect our planet. And the great news is, we've trained 140 staff and we're well on the way to Silver already!

the summer, wildfires in Europe, year round footage of floods and drought related famines all send a clear message: no one is immune to the effects of climate change and we all must act now to play our part in saving our planet.

That's why we declared a climate emergency in 2019, and it's why we're upping the ante now, pledging to go greener faster to help make sure our district heads towards net zero at an accelerated pace.

We've reviewed our activities and are focussing on the things that matter most in terms of carbon reduction and the longterm safeguarding of our environment.

We can't do this without your help. Whether it's changing the way you move around your local area, adapting your routine to walk or cycle more or increasing your recycling rate, we're all in this together and we need you on side."



WeCAN — WE'RE ALL IN THIS TOGETHER



We've renewed our support for the Winchester Climate Action Network project (WeCAN), which will see funding continue until 2024.

WeCAN is a network of community leaders who have united for climate action and produced Climate Impact Reports for all our parishes. They've created a fantastic knowledge information hub to share advice too. WILDLIFE SPECIAL

GRASS SNAKES, NEWTS & TOADS, OH MY!

Biodiversity really matters and it's so rewarding to see species return as a result of the action plan in place.

Smooth and palmate newts, toads and many other species have been identified as part of our amphibian survey at a pond created only a few years ago in Greenacres, Otterbourne.

Amphibians are slippery characters so inventive methods are needed to spot them... 'Torching' (shining a torch over the pond in the dark) and bottle trapping, where



Our team is also planning to keep the invasive plant Himalayan Balsam under control while reviewing techniques to allow for other aquatic plants to establish there... anything to keep our wildlife comfortable!

LIVING ON THE HEDGE

You'll be sad to hear that hedgehog populations are declining. These charismatic little creatures aren't able to thrive in urban environments due to loss of natural habitat and food sources, and an increase in road collisions. So, how can you help a hedgehog?

- Make sure they can access your garden gardens are potential food sources for hedgehogs can they get under your gate? If you feel it's secure enough could you perhaps prop your gate open for hedgehog traffic?
- Leave areas of your garden wild many of us are already leaving a patch of grass to grow a bit longer, allowing flower species to grow in the lawn and creating more food sources for hedgehogs and other wildlife. You can also create habitat piles from grass cuttings, logs, branches and scrub, these are great places for hedgehogs (or other species) to hibernate or take shelter.
- Avoid using slug pellets and other chemicals they can be fatal to hedgehogs. Try natural alternatives such as putting gravel or crushed shell around the plants or using copper strips.
- Have a compost heap the middle of a compost heap is lovely and warm hedgehogs have worked this out and use it as heated accommodation!
- Check long grass before mowing do a quick check for sleeping hedgehogs before you mow in the spring and summer.

To ensure that the district capitalises on the opportunities of green growth, work has already started on the delivery of our ten year Green Economic Development Strategy. This will set out how, over the next decade, we aim to increase business diversity, skills and productivity, develop more affordable and sustainable housing; enhance biodiversity; expand the use of renewable energy; and reduce traffic congestion and cut carbon emissions.

Following consultation with businesses and key stakeholders an initial two year action plan has been agreed and a new Sustainable Tourism Strategy and Cultural Strategy will be coming soon....

LAINSTON HOUSE HOTEL GREEN ACCREDITED

Lainston House has joined an elite group of only 400 organisations across the UK to receive the B Corporation; a prestigious accreditation for companies who demonstrate commitment to social and environmental goals over profits. Among the hotel's many green credentials include producing homegrown apple juice from the 20 varieties of apple trees in the grounds, to repurposing wood from pallet crates into compost bins for the kitchen garden.



MONEY MATTERS

Unprecedented financial pressures and rises in interest rates and inflation this autumn have certainly made financial planning for the council more challenging.

We created an 'Exceptional Inflation Reserve' this summer in anticipation of these pressures, which has given us a sound financial buffer. However, the current financial position means we're working through ways to balance the budget. The Cabinet will consider the medium-term financial strategy at a meeting in November.



SUPPORTING YOU THROUGH DIFFICULT TIMES

We announced a £200,000 package of measures in September to provide help and practical support around the cost of living crisis.

An Emergency Grant Fund will enable partner organisations to provide advice on reducing energy bills and accessing benefits, grants, food and emergency support. And a Cost of Living Summit will bring together organisations to coordinate and maximise efforts to help local people, and provide a network of warm, safe spaces this winter.

BIDDING FOR EXTRA MONEY FOR OUR DISTRICT

We are actively taking our opportunities to bid for extra funding that will make a real impact on our district and the people who live and work here. We are awaiting government approval of £1 million action plan for UK Shared Prosperity Funding, which, if successful, will support street markets, town centres, cultural activities and more. We are also putting together a bid for £745,000 from the Rural England Prosperity Fund to support new and existing rural based businesses.

"Money is on everyone's mind this autumn, and your council is working hard to continue to deliver support while making sure that we invest in our district and our services.

We're not the only council taking a hard look at ways we can manage the impact of rising interest rates and high inflation, and our efforts are, as ever, all about focusing on what we can do to support our community, whilst being realistic about what we can and cannot achieve in the medium term while this difficult situation continues.

Obviously we're continuing to apply for funds so that we can use any money granted to support our communities and improve rural and urban areas."

A THOUSAND **THANKS**

With more than five million visitors to the district each year and 8,000 commuters passing through Winchester Railway Station every weekday, the area around the station has long been considered a key gateway site - as well as being a much-loved neighbourhood.

Together with Network Rail and London & Continental Railways (LCR) we are exploring ideas to reinvigorate the area, including looking at the development of a green travel hub

with a reinvigorated offer for retail and business. Our initial consultation ran from 1 August to 23 October and we are delighted that 1,087 local people were able to have their say. This is just the start of the process and we will be continuing to update residents as the vision takes shape. Watch this space!

Earlier this year we announced an open call for designs to deliver a vibrant, bespoke mural at St Maurice's Covert between the High Street and Winchester Cathedral. Fromover thirty submissions from across the UK the commissionhas been successfully awarded to Molly Hawkins.

Molly is renowned for her large-scale colourful art in public spaces. Her love for bright, vivid colours and energetic designs, which have become her hallmark, features strongly in her design for St Maurice's Covert which also picks out heritage features. It's the last phase of improvements to this feature of the city and was unveiled in October 2022.

TRANSFORMING KINGS WALK

In recent months we've spoken to businesses in and around Kings Walk and their views have formed plans on how we can revitalise this busy part of our city and transform the outdoor space.

We want to attract more creative and independent businesses to the area to realise our longer-term development of a 'cultural quarter' where residents, shoppers, commuters and visitors can meet and relax.

This is only the beginning, but the area will look and feel very different. It's a step to realising the potential of Kings Walk as the plans to create flexible workspaces,

retail and leisure facilities, high-quality housing and an attractive public realm also take shape.

Our draft 'Regulation 18' Local Plan is out for consultation from 2 November 2022 until midnight on 14 December 2022. Some



- Responding to the climate emergency, setting high standards for environmental design for homes and making it attractive, safe and easy to walk, cycle and use other low carbon methods of transport
- Affordable housing recognising it's more difficult for all ages (especially younger generations) to find homes they can afford, for the first time, the plan replaces an 'expectation' for affordable housing that was too often missed, with a minimum requirement that developers have to achieve
- A 'brownfield site first' approach across the district.
 All sites put forward in the plan have been assessed to have the best sustainability and have the least environmental impact on our district. 90% of sites submitted by developers have not been included.

Since 2021 we've built 121 new homes, including 33 under the shared ownership scheme for those taking their first steps on the housing ladder. We have another 130 new council homes under construction in both Winchester and North Whiteley.

We know that the current cost of living crisis is making many people anxious, and that's why we've put in place a £200,000 programme of support for local residents. We've also allocated £740,000 to prevent homelessness among our newest residents, those fleeing the war in Ukraine.

Our community has always pulled together in difficult times, and I'd like to thank everyone for everything you've done and are doing to care for others in our community.

INTRODUCING COBBETT GARDENS

Great news! A new affordable housing scheme for Winchester City Council at North Whiteley is now underway, with 54 houses located in what will be known as Cobbett Gardens.

The new development will be a mix of two, three and four bedroom energy efficient homes for affordable rent and shared ownership, with some properties due to be ready later this year.

Our house building programme aims to address the climate emergency by ensuring all new homes meet the Association for Environment Conscious Building standard – a significant step towards our net zero target.

WELCOMING **UKRAINIAN GUESTS** INTO OUR COMMUNITY

We've pledged our support to the City of Sanctuary movement and this means all asylum seekers and refugees will be warmly welcomed in our district.

Winchester residents have welcomed more Ukrainian citizens than anywhere else in the county – at the latest count we have in the region of 200 hosts who have families staying.

We're so pleased to be able to work closely with local people and organisations to provide a safe, friendly and supportive community for those who have fled their homes, livelihoods and, in many cases loved ones, to escape the conflict.



We established support hubs to offer advice both for Ukrainian visitors and their hosts, on issues such as housing, employment opportunities, benefits and financial aid initiatives.

456 visits were made to our Ukrainian support hubs between June and October 2022.



refugees under the Homes for Ukraine Scheme. £740,000 of funding was allocated to provide a specialised team to support Ukrainian refugees who will help them prevent homelessness, secure longerterm housing and integrate smoothly into the community.




GO PURPLE








70 YEARS SERVICE HER MAJESTY QUEEN ELIZABETH II

We were deeply saddened, when in September, Her Majesty the Queen passed away.

Following the announcement our district turned out in force, laying flowers in tribute, attending a special service in Winchester Cathedral, and signing the Book of Condolence in our thousands.

In an historic ceremony, the Mayor of Winchester, Cllr Derek Green, announced the accession of King Charles III in a special proclamation ceremony at Winchester Guidhall, attended by Her Majesty's Lord Lieutenant of Hampshire, Nigel Atkinson.

Her Majesty the Queen will be remembered for years to come for her unstinting devotion to serving her country. We remain grateful to her for keeping her promise to our nation and profoundly thankful for her 70 year reign.

Over the summer we had celebrated her life first by marking her Platinum Jubilee over the long bank holiday weekend in June, supporting 49 street parties up and down the district and almost 100 tree planting events for the Queen's Green Canopy initiative; then supporting the Commonwealth Games later in the summer by welcoming the Queens Baton Relay (see page 17).


During her reign Queen Elizabeth II visited Winchester many times – once even before she was Queen – passing through Winchester on the way to her honeymoon in Broadlands in 1947.

Highlights include a visit on 5 July 1955 to mark the 800th anniversary of the city's first charter, where Her Majesty gave a speech on the balcony of the Guildhall, with children lining the roofs of shops and houses along The Broadway, to get a glimpse of the Queen. There were other visits too, among others, Winchester Cathedral to distribute Maundy Money, Winchester College, Sir John Moore barracks, Elizabeth Il court at County Hall and Hampshire Records Office. Her last visit to the district was in 2007, when Her Majesty opened the new Royal Military Police Museum at the Defence College of

LICORICIA

King Charles III (as Prince of Wales) also visited Winchester this year to mark the installation of a statue of a highly influential Jewish woman, Licoricia, and her son Asher. The bronze statue depicts Licoricia making her way to her home in Jewry Street where she was later found murdered.

Winchester has an important Jewish past dating back to the mid-1100s,

making it one of the earliest, largest and most successful Jewish settlements in England.
