

Use of Cookies

All pages set the following cookies:

_utm[a/b/c/z] - Google analytics. These cookies are used to collect information about how visitors use our site, but not to identify an individual. We use the information to compile reports and to help us improve the site content and usability of our Website. The cookies collect information such as the number of visitors to the site, where visitors have come to the site from and the pages they visited.

Whoson - this is set by the live help feature.

All pages set the following cookies after user interaction with a feature of the website:

CookieNotice.Hide – This is set when a user dismisses the cookie notice that appears in the banner area so it no longer continues to display.

Accessibility.DisplayPref – This is set only when a user selects one of the text size/contrast options. The preference is remembered so that the same look and feel is retained for each page and future visit to our website.

.ASPXAUTH.ModuleServices.Member – Set when a user logs into the website.

rwebooks[...] – Set when using the Browse Aloud feature.
