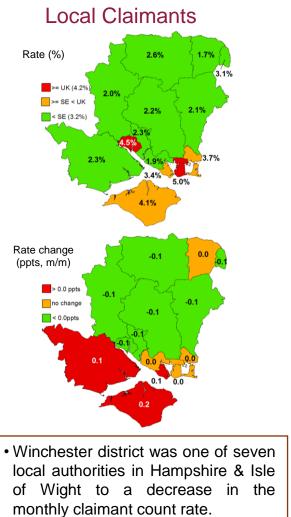


Unemployment

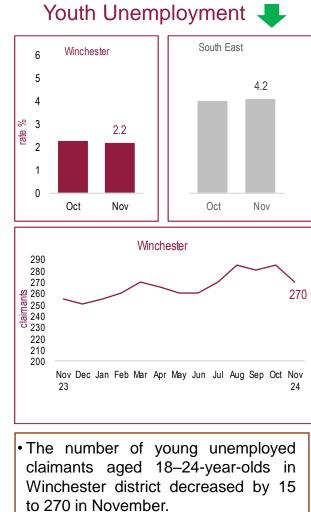




- The number of unemployed claimants in Winchester district (not adjusted for seasonal factors) decreased by 50 to 1,740 but higher on the year (+195). Small decreases across all three broad age groups.
- The rate down on the month to 2.2% in November, well below South East (3.2%) and UK rates (4.2%).

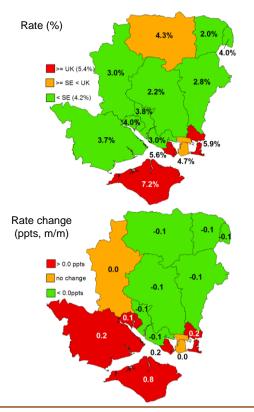


• Like most Hampshire & Isle of Wight authorities, Winchester is below the two benchmarks, with the two cities above UK rate and Gosport and Havant and IoW above SE.



• The youth claimant unemployment rate decreased to 2.2%. The Winchester district 18-24-year-old rate is well below the South East (4.2%) and the UK (5.4%) averages.

Young Local Claimants

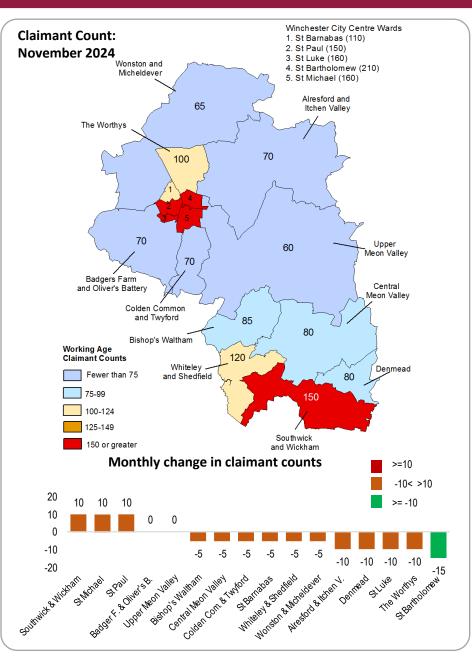


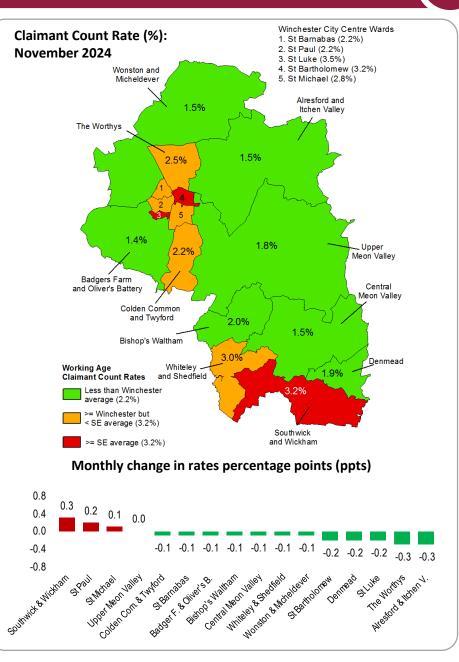
- Most Hampshire & Isle of Wight districts have rates below the SE and UK rates, while Havant, Gosport and IoW remain above the UK rate.
- Half of the 14 Hampshire & Isle of Wight local authorities (including Winchester) saw unemployment rates for young people decrease on the month.

Jobs and Unemployment: Local Unemployment Claimants at Ward Level

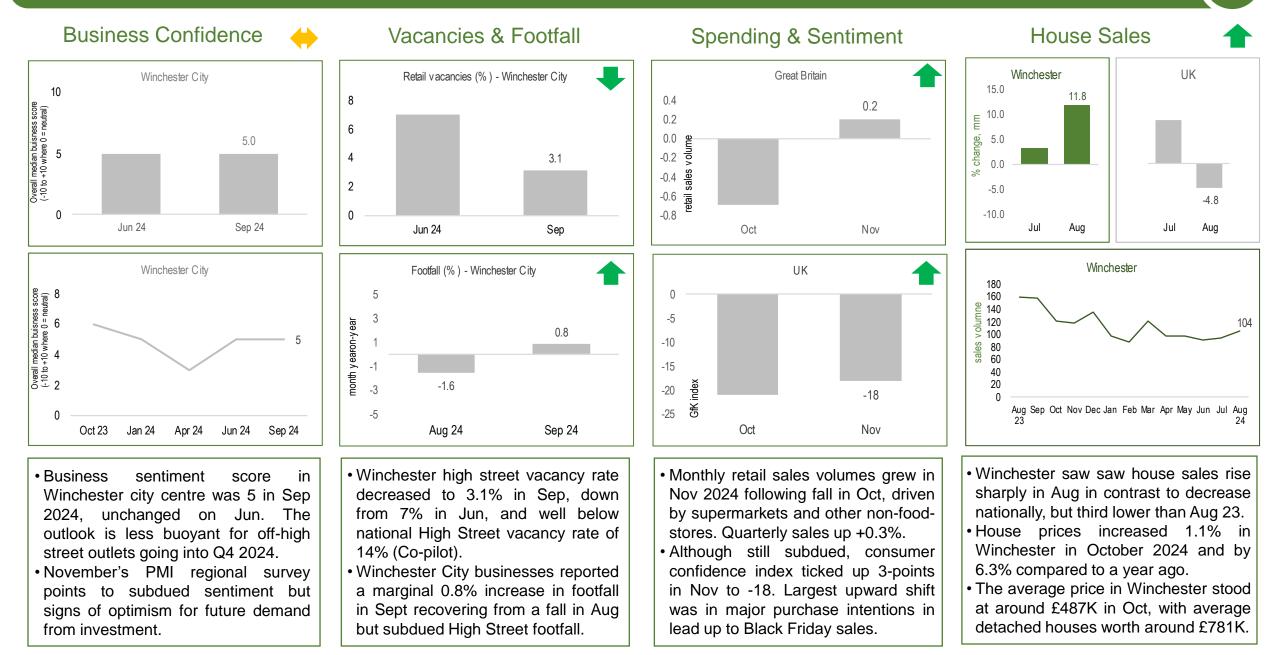
• St Bartholomew Ward was the only Winchester ward to see a decrease in claimants on the month (>-10).

- The remaining wards all met the threshold for no change (between -10 and +10 claimants).
- Claimant count concentrations (over 100) are in the City of Winchester or in the south in Whiteley & Shedfield and Southwick and Wickham Wards.
- Three of the 16 district wards saw an increase in their claimant rates in November, with Southwick & Wickham seeing +0.3 (albeit from a small base). Upper Meon Valley saw no change while the remaining wards saw no monthly change in rates.
- There are three wards with an unemployment rate above or equal to the South East average (3.2%). No Winchester district wards are above the UK average (4.2%) but St Luke Ward with 3.5% is the closest.





Spending and Sentiment



Business-specific Intelligence and News

- Winchester City BID for Sep 2024 reported a median performance score for all outlets at '7', down compared with Jun but comparable to Sep 2023. Median performance scores also down for Retail/Hospitality (RH) at 6 and Professional services (PS) at 7. Both denote modest performances as the economy expanded more slowly in the third quarter of 2024.
- Retail and Hospitality outlets and Professionals services both reported no change in their total sales [both in-store and online], compared with a year ago. Sales off-the-High Street underperformed, down by 5% year on year and largely down to lower footfall. However, smaller Independent PSs performed better with sales up by 5% in the year to date.
- Short term sentiment scores remain unchanged over the past three months. Sentiment scores were also +5 for the High Street but and 0 off-High Street businesses.
- Sales expectations, although positive during 2024 compared with 2023, have moderated. RH and PS revenues were projected to rise by 2.5% and 9% respectively and the start of the year when comparing 2024 with 2023. The latest estimate is 2% and 'no change'.
- The Winchester High Street vacancy rate was down to 3.1% in Sep, more than half the rate in Jun (7%) and close to the healthy rate (3%, Savills) and well below the national vacancy rate (14%). The arrivals of Cornish Bakery (Oct) and the Westlands Farm Shop (Nov) helped bring down vacancy rates.
- Latest Monthly Place Report has **Winchester businesses seeing 0.8% increase in footfall in Sep 2024** compared a fall in Aug of 1.6%. However, High Street and Off-High Street footfall was down by 5% and 10% respectively in the 9 months to the end of September. Anecdotally, poor weather cited as having the most significant effect on footfall.

Public Policy News

- On 30 October 2024 Chancellor Rachel Reeves delivered the Budget. Businesses expected to play a significant part in contributing to raising £40bn.
- From April 2025, employers' NICs will increase from 13.8 per cent to 15 per cent. In addition, the threshold at which employer NICs become payable falls from £9,100 to £5,000. This is forecast to raise £25bn per annum.
- The headline rate of UK corporation tax will be kept at 25%, and corporation tax small profits rate kept at 19%.
- Two permanent lower rates of business rates for retail, hospitality and leisure properties. In short-term a 40% relief for 2025/26 up to a cap of £110,000 per business.
- Capital Gains Tax rate for Business Asset Disposal Relief (BADR) (previously called Entrepreneurs Relief) to continue, although the tax rate to increase from 10% to 14% for disposals made on or after 6 April 2025, and 14% 18% on disposals made on or after 6 April 2026 (an increased bill of up to £80,000 for businesses sold after April 2026).
- Business property relief and agricultural property relief will change from 6 April 2026. The existing 100 per cent rates of relief will continue only for the first £1m of combined agricultural and business property. This led to farmers' protests in Westminster.
- English Devolution White Paper published in December. In two tier areas, Government will establish Combined County Authorities before moving to single tier structures. The Government will expect all two-tier areas and smaller or failing unitaries to develop proposals for reorganisation. For most areas this will mean creating councils with a population of 500,000 or more, but there may be some exceptions.

How to read 'traffic lights':



Refers to decline or growth relative to the previous period (GVA, PMI business activity and business prices indicators, job postings, business investment, retail and house sales).

In the case of inflation, PAYE employment & earnings and consumer sentiment, it refers to the direction of travel relative to the previous period.

For claimant count unemployment indicators the change refers to the rate not the level. For example, a decrease in youth unemployment would see a downward green arrow.

† The local estimate is preliminary and it needs to be treated with a high degree of caution since it is based on the sectoral mix of the Portsmouth economy and the national sectoral impacts.

Sources:

The primary data sources are the Office for National Statistics (ONS) and HMRC, while additional data comes from several commercial sources such as S&P Global, Lightcast, CBI, BCC, HM Land Registry, the Bank of England and Winchester BID.

Monthly/Quarterly data for Business Activity, Jobs & Earnings, Unemployment and Sentiment & Investment.

In the case of several monthly indicators, the South East is used as a proxy geography for Winchester and Hampshire.

Estimates of payrolled employees and their pay from HMRC Pay As You Earn (PAYE) Real Time Information are preliminary but seasonally adjusted. Employment figures differ from the ONS Labour Force Survey (LFS) data. Moreover, median pay figures differ from the ONS Average Weekly Earnings (AWE) and are based on gross earnings which do not cover other sources of income, such as self-employment.
